Hidcote Manor - One of the UK's Great Gardens

The spring 2015 CVRS UK Garden tour will visit Hidcote Manor Garden-here's a sneak peak.

Hidcote is an Arts and Crafts garden in the north Cotswolds, a stone's throw from Stratford-upon-Avon. Created by the talented American horticulturist, Major Lawrence Johnston its colourful and intricately designed outdoor 'rooms' are always full of surprises.

Johnston and his mother, settled in Britain about 1900, and Lawrence immediately became a British citizen and fought in the British army during the Boer war. In 1907 Johnston's mother, Mrs. Gertrude Winthrop (she had re-married), purchased the Hidcote Manor Estate. It was situated in a part of Britain with strong connections to the then-burgeoning Arts and Crafts movement and an Anglicized American artistic expatriate community centred nearby at Broadway, Worcestershire.

Johnston soon became interested in turning the fields around the house into a garden. By 1910 he had begun to lay out the key features of the garden, and by the 1920s he had twelve full-time gardeners working for him.

After World War II Johnston spent most of his time at Jardin Serre de la Madone, his garden in the south of France; and in 1947 he entrusted Hidcote to the National Trust.

The style of the garden has been widely imitated. In 2007 a temporary garden designed by Chris Beardshaw that drew inspiration from Johnson's Hidcote was constructed at the Chelsea Flower Show in London.

Explore the maze of narrow paved pathways and discover secret gardens, magnificent vistas and plants that burst with colour. Many of the plants found growing in the garden were collected from Johnston's many plant hunting trips to faraway places. It's the perfect place if you're in need of gardening inspiration.

Find a quiet spot and sit on one of the ornate benches and watch green woodpeckers search for their lunch or listen to the calls from the buzzards circling overhead. Time it right and you might catch a glimpse of the elusive hummingbird moth.

Meander through the intricate gardens and into the Wilderness. This secluded stretch of tall trees is just right for a picnic. Take a glimpse beyond the



boundary and see the garden blend effortlessly into the countryside beyond.

Lawrence Johnston was influenced in creating his garden at Hidcote by the work of Alfred Parsons and Gertrude Jekyll, who were designing gardens of hardy plants contained within sequences of outdoor "rooms". The theme was in the air: Vita Sackville-West and Harold Nicolson's Sissinghurst Castle Garden was laid out as a sequence of such spaces, without, it seems, direct connection with the reclusive and shy Major Johnston. Hidcote's outdoor "rooms" have various characters and themes, achieved by the use of box hedges, hornbeam and yew, and stone walls. These rooms, such as the 'White



Garden' and 'Fuchsia Garden' are linked, some by vistas, and furnished with topiaries. Some have ponds and fountains, and all are planted with flowers in bedding schemes. They surround the 17th century manor house, and there are a number of outhouses and a kitchen garden.

Johnston's care in selecting the best plants is reflected in the narrow-leaved lavender, Lavandula angustifolia 'Hidcote', in the Penstemon 'Hidcote Pink' and in the hybrid Hypericum 'Hidcote Gold', acclaimed as the finest hardy St John's Wort.

What Global Warming!

According to our Prime Minster, global warming does not exist and the increase in unusual weather events that we are experiencing around the world are part of the natural fluctuations. This view confuses a lot of individuals, particularly scientists who make their decisions on facts rather than faith.

This last year has been one of confusion in the local climate. We had a very warm winter last year and a long rather mild spring. This was followed by a very long warm summer with

virtually no rain. Even my efforts at rain dances, done at night so as not to frighten the neighbours, did not produce a drop. I lost about ten of my rhododendrons through drought despite hand watering as much as the municipality allowed. Dragging that hose around nearly an acre in the early morning or evening may well have reduced my weight and strengthened my body but it did not provides sufficient water for some of my favourites.

So we come to autumn and rain at last! What do we find but exceptionally warm weather. Finally, many of the rhododendrons have admitted that they are really confused. R. 'Dave Dougan', named after one of our



earliest members and a Silver Medal winner, gave up waiting and decided to flower. This was followed by R.'Capistrano', a nice yellow, which struggled to flower but never quite managed to open fully. In the case of R. 'Dave Dougan' about half the buds did not open so that we will see some colour in the spring. In the case of R. 'Capistrano', all buds tried to open and we will lose next year's bloom completely.

Finally, I visited my daughter in Port Alberni. She is the one who pleads with me not to take her any more plants as it just gives her more gardening work to do! What do I find but an unnamed rhododendron covered in flowers. A close look at the plant shows that there are still

a lot of buds unopened. "Winter" is not over, however, and with this "lack of global warming", we may well see the others opened before spring arrives.

The unpredictability of nature always adds to the fun of gardening and it appears as if we should be prepared for a great deal more as this period of "non-global warming" continues, or the government changes.

The total cost is in the range of about \$3000 (not including air fares which are your responsibility) per person for double room. Single accommodation is available for about \$700 extra.

We still have three seats on this private tour for CVRS and ARS members and members of Garden Clubs that are registered with the BC Council of Garden Clubs.

Participants should be in good physical condition as there is a fair amount of garden and site walking on this tour but no vigourous hikes. Final 4 and 5 star hotel selection is now completed and our final hotel for the last three days of this tour is the Novotel Heathrow, very close to Heathrow airport.

Trelissick

A tranquil varied garden in a fabulous setting, with a superb collection of tender and exotic plants


One of the gardens on the 2015 CVRS Spring Tour of the UK is Trelissick near Truro in Cornwall. We will be taking a ferry on the River Fal to get to this very special place.

On its own peninsula with ever-changing views of the estuary of the River Fal, Trelissick has one of the most amazing natural settings in the UK. There are more than 12 hectares (30 acres) of elevated garden to explore, with twisting paths that lead you through significant collections of hydrangeas, rhododendrons, camellias, ginger lilies and year-round exciting woodland plants.




As well as the garden, the 121-hectare (300-acre) estate, with its countryside, woodlands and coast, makes for breath taking walks.

The garden has been in the ownership of the National Trust since 1955 when it was donated by Ida Copeland following the death of her son Geoffrey. A stained glass memorial bearing the Copeland Crest remains to this effect in Feock parish church.



Many of the species that flourish in the mild Cornish air, including the rhododendrons and azaleas which are now such a feature of the garden, were planted by the Copelands including hydrangeas, camellias and flowering cherries, and exotics such as the ginkgo and various species of palm. They also ensured that the blossoms they nurtured had a wider, if unknowing audience. Mr. Ronald Copeland was chairman and later managing director of his family's business, the Spode china factory, and flowers grown at Trelissick were used as models for those painted on ware produced at the works.
