Bringing the World to Milner Gardens and Woodland The Story of the Greig Rhododendron Species Garden



John Deniseger is a retired biologist, and avid gardener, outdoor enthusiast and Past President of the Nanaimo Rhododendron Society. He is the current Chair of the Milner Garden and Woodlands Society Board and a member of the Greig Rhododendron Species Garden Advisory Group. John and his wife June received the ARS Silver Medal in 2021.

Milner Gardens and Woodland in Qualicum Beach is a 70-acre waterfront estate that was gifted to Vancouver Island University in 1996 and has been open to the public since 2001.

In 2014, a partnership was formed between V.I.U., Milner and the five Vancouver Island chapters of the American Rhododendron Society, with the goal of establishing the first Canadian Rhododendron species garden. The intent was to highlight the tremendous diversity within the genus Rhododendron, while educating the public about conservation and where rhododendrons are found in the wild.

The story of the Greig Rhododendron Species Garden is one of perseverance, generosity, and teamwork. While the garden officially opened in April 2018, it has become a showpiece which continues to evolve as more species and companion plants are added.

Choosing Rhododendrons

for More Reasons Than Flower Colour

With over 28,000 cultivars in the International Rhododendron Registry, finding a few rhododendrons for your garden that you might like shouldn't be very difficult -- and it isn't. The difficulty comes in narrowing your choices due to limited space on your property.



Many shoppers rush into Plant Sales areas and head directly to the rainbow corner where spectacular rhododendrons are in full bloom. They score! Their carts are soon full of rhododendrons with large bold trusses in just the colours that they love. For several years they follow this scooping shopping ritual. Their rhododendrons reliably perform in perfect harmony during the first two weeks of May. In time, when they receive invitations to visit others' gardens over the next month or two, they begin to notice that rhododendrons are still blooming, and some have buds not even beginning to open. Friends have also posted rhododendron photos in March and April.

Do you find yourself beginning to look at your favourite flowering shrub differently and becoming both amazed and overwhelmed by the complexity of choices? Flower variations alone are mind boggling.

Special Rhododendron Flower Features

Corolla Forms: Similar Colour Contrasts with entirely different effects

- **R.** 'Starbright Champagne' (Frank Fujioka hybrid)
 - Pointed upright corollas star-shaped; tidy throat of contrasting colour
- R. 'Jeda' (Jack Lofthouse hybrid)
 - Ruffled, curling corolla; double, prominent calyxes
 - Outside of corolla contrasts with the inside and highlights the generous spotting





Truss Formations:

- R. 'Goldbukett' (Hachmann's hybrid)
 - Tightly clustered truss
- R. 'Silver Skies '(Frank Fujioka)
 - Lax truss, displaying the outer side and soft blending of colour to the scalloped edges of the bell-shaped corollas





Flower shape and structure:

- R. 'Senator Henry Jackson' (Larson)
 - Bold, large, flat, wide open; corollas roll backward
- R. 'Winter Dreams' (Jim Barlup)
 - Shy, humble, side-facing, peering outward; corollas curve inward





Truss positions:

- R. 'Fantastica' (Hans Hachmann)
 - Perky truss perched on top, above foliage
- R. 'Towner Crest'(Evelyn Weesjes)
 - Trusses mingle with lovely foliage





Flower and Truss Sizes:

- R. diversipilosum 'Milky Way' (RSF selected form)
 - Petite ball of tiny, starry white flowers (fragrant foliage)
- R. 'Loderi King George' (Loder)
 - Extremely large, bold flowers and trusses (fragrant flowers)





Flower Pistil and Stamens:

Azalea (Unknown): Azaleas – 5 stamens

- Stunning, very long curling stamens
- R. 'Muncaster Mist' (Ramsden) Rhododendrons 10 or more stamens
 - Shorter, straighter, contrasting colours





Size and Colours of Pistil and Stamens:

R. calophytum var. calophytum (species)

Prominent supersized pistil

R. 'Irene'

Dramatic stamens with diminution of the pistil





Take your time when you shop for rhododendrons for your gardens.

The features discussed above represent only two snapshots of *Rhododendron* flower variations in each example.

Flower colours may be white, red, pink, yellow, almost blue, purple, magenta, orange, and shades and mixtures of most of these colors with striking variations in throats and blotches. Add to those, the effects of colourful pistils and stamens.

Consider too the broad variations in flower shapes: campanulate, openly campanulate, ventricose campanulate, funnel shaped, openly funnel shaped, widely funnel shaped, tubular funnel shaped, flat saucer shaped, tubular, and rotate.

Pat Halligan (JARS v38n3) studied "floral substance", which is characterized as a desirable quality which enhances bloom longevity, reduces marginal burn and makes the flower look and feel more substantial. He determined this to be a combination of petal thickness and inherent stiffness.

The topic of "Choosing Rhododendrons" for your garden could easily evolve into a six-part series of articles. Factoring into choices are foliage variations, sun and heat tolerance, drainage requirements, size and habit, and hardiness.

COMPANION PLANTS of the Month

In the last newsletter, we announced that Carrie Nelson would be our new voice in Companion Plants of the Month. Unfortunately, Carrie has had to ask that someone else write these monthly articles; as many of you are wonderful plant persons, why not consider this as a new personal challenge for the season?

In keeping with the theme of dramatic differences in plants, and therefore the abundant opportunities for choice, these companion plants play very distinct roles in gardens. Two are large leaved and bold; two are diminutive in habit and floral displays, but noticeable because of those characteristics.

Exotic, bold, tropical-like foliage:

There has been a surge in interest for bold-leaved plants. Fortunately, gardeners do not have to fuss with borderline hardy plants to achieve this lush, tropical effect in shade gardens. There are more than 30 *Ligularia* with many variations in plant size, distinctive leaf shapes, and striking floral displays.

Plants like *Ligularia japonica* may grow to 6 feet in height with foliage 16 inches in diameter. The buds are hairy squat green pumpkins, perhaps more interesting than the four-inch blooms.

Ligularia dentata 'Britt Marie Crawford' is the darkest of the big-leaved purple Ligularia. The leaves emerge a luscious, glossy, chocolate-maroon and given a bit of sun will maintain the purple tones longer before fading to green yet retaining the purple undersides. L. dentata 'Osiris Café Noir' is a new version with stunning burgundy chocolate foliage.

Ligularia stenocephala 'Bottle Rocket', preceded by 'Rocket' and 'Little Rocket', is the latest and most compact in the Rocket family.

Bergenia cordifolia, perhaps ordinary to some gardeners, is a hardy and vigorous clumpforming, evergreen perennial native to Siberia.

Low-growing tropical-like foliage of leathery, shiny, heart-shaped leaves are stunning in various-sized groupings or mass plantings in moist shady areas, and therefore well-suited as companion plants for rhododendrons.

An English selection, *Bergenia* 'Bressingham Ruby' provides a rich, deep, burnished-maroon winter colour with magenta-pink flowers in early spring. Both flowers and leaves are lovely in floral bouquets.











B. 'Dragonfly Angel Kiss' has semi-double flowers emerging snow white that take on a light pink glow as they mature.

There are many cultivars with flowers ranging from white to magenta-pink. The foliage of *Bergenia* 'Lunar Glow' begins a soft creamy-yellow tone, matures to a dark green, and becomes red for the winter.



Diminutive and delicate:

Hepatica nobilis is a lovely plant for growing in damp but well-drained, light and fertile soil, particularly under deciduous trees. The flowers appear on fuzzy 4-6 inch stems in February and March while few other plants are in bloom, requiring sunlight for best performance, but respite from sun and heat during the summer.





Its delicate flowers are most commonly a bright blue or lavender, but they also come in white or pink shades. Three-lobed, rounded leaves remain evergreen until spring. Because its leaf shape supposedly resembles a liver, it is also referred to as Liverwort or Liverleaf.

The winter foliage of *Hepatica nobilis*, nearly hidden beneath delicate blooms in March, will soon be replaced by fresh green three-lobed foliage.

Saxifraga umbrosa:

Another special charming evergreen foliage plant for the front of the rhododendron woodland gardens is **Saxifraga umbrosa 'London Pride'**. It is also known affectionately as *Pyrenean saxifrage, true London pride, whimsey, none-so-pretty, king's Feather, kiss-me-quick, and St. Patrick's cabbage*, among other doting names. A phenomenally useful plant!

A lovely dwarf version, **Saxifraga primuloides hort**, is an adaptable workhorse with dainty spring flowers.

It is just over 100 years since Lionel de Rothschild started work on one of the best-known woodland gardens in the world, one devoted above all to his favourite plant, the rhododendron. His work was continued by his sons and is now looked after by the two generations after that. His grandson Lionel will talk about the history and about the plants in this iconic garden.

Lionel de Rothschild is the grandson and namesake of the creator of Exbury Gardens. He has written and lectured on Exbury Garden, rhododendrons, and other Rothschild gardens. He is also a trustee of The Rothschild Archive in London and sits on the Garden Council of Borde Hill Gardens in West Sussex.
