Highlights of the Spring Fraser Valley CVRS Bus Tour

On Friday May 13 at 6:15 am CVRS and members from other ARS clubs and friends arrived at Duncan's train station to head off to the Duke Point ferry terminal for a bus tour of some very special gardens in the upper Fraser Valley. In spite of being a Friday the 13th everything went very smoothly the first day but day 2 presented some unexpected bus challenges.

We arrived at our first garden in the late morning -the Finley Rhodo Garden in north Surrey. This 3 acre hillside site overlooking the Fraser River was first started in second growth woodland more than 50 years ago by Vern and Doc Finley. Doc passed away several years ago. The garden got beyond the capacity of the Finley's and is slowly being recovered with family assistance and lots of grunt work. Hundreds of huge rhodos tower over the visitor. The thousands of rhodos on site were most impressive but the cool 2011 spring held back some flowering that had been anticipated.

Nevertheless the 90 minutes on site were barely adequate to take in the whole garden. The family also has a rhodo nursery and made some of their more spectacular azaleas and rhodos available for sale to the group. These were quickly snapped up like a women's shoe sale and the last compartment on the bus

started to fill with plants.

Our bus started to exhibit some challenges with shifting and getting into reverse on the steep road. We then headed to nearby Bear Creek Park for a picnic and a much appreciated bag lunch. The gardens and trees there were also impressive on this sunny and warm spring day.

Our next stop was in south Langley at the Wingswept Garden, home of John and Gael Dodd. Most people were blown away by its design and content including impressive rhodos. Carved from bush and peat bog, beginning in 1978, this evolving landscape garden has Zhu gardens in become a haven for birds and plant lovers. Grassy vistas, ponds, trees, rocks and sky are united by large plantings of rhododendrons, roses, and herbaceous borders. The project began as the family purchased a vacant lot with most of the alders and conifers having been recently felled-basically a mess -that has been transformed into one of the more beautiful formal backyard gardens ever seen by most people on the tour. We were given a hearty welcome with warm sunshine, a soggy lawn and lots of rhodo blooming along with tasty refreshments. There were many interesting companion plants and information from the owners of this 3 acre paradise of pools, spectacular annual and perennial beds and thoughtful plantings of thousands of different plants and rhodos. Like many impressive gardens the front yard, while also beautiful, gives no indication of the mature jewel that lies in the back. Just a fantastic garden!!

We then headed to the iconic Harrison Hot Springs hotel where the group enjoyed a full course dinner and entertainment in the Copper Room. This was followed by a very relaxing late-night soak in the hot springs. It rained during the night but we awoke to a hearty buffet breakfast and sun peaking out of the clouds. But the cold spring continued for a short time that morning as we headed for the next garden.

Most rhodoholics have heard of Lu Agassiz, the incredible creation of Dr. Mike Bale and his family. It is located along the Lougheed Highway on a steep 25 acre hillside overlooking Mount Cheam and the upper Fraser River valley. Mike, a practicing medical doctor in Chilliwack bought the land in 1976.

Then after attending the ARS convention in Victoria in 1989 he discovered what he wanted to do with the land. He had part of his site cleared in 1992. It was a perfect, mountain slope often bathed in mist and rain.

He began planting rhododendrons and figures there are now more than 10,000 on site, many with drip irrigation. We must have seen another 5,000 in a maze of greenhouses on site. Dr. Bale, members of his family and volunteers guided many small groups to various highlights of the garden-a rhodo fanatics dream. Vistas of the garden show rock faces, a waterwheel, waterfalls, beautiful pergolas, wooden viewing platforms overlooking the Valley, a rail speeder,, bridges, large stones artistically arranged and an incredible network of trails.

Parts of the property are very steep and rocky.

Rhodos are planted anywhere and everywhere under the canopy of mostly second growth mixed conifer and hardwood forests. There is so much to this garden it is almost impossible to comprehend its magnitude. Dr. Bale generously gave our group many rhodos and the bus continued to fill up with plants.

The Bale's hospitality was also impressive, fresh squeezed juice in mimosas, other interesting refreshments, coffee, tea, sandwiches and many types of goodies were offered and accepted by our malnourished group from Vancouver and Saltspring Islands.

Oh yeah-speaking of the bus- the transmission finally called it quits and seized up as they driver was trying to turn the bus around at the entrance to Lu Zhu. Fortunately we were able to rent another local bus in a

fairly timely manner and the first move of everything off our bus to the other went smoothly. Thank the Lord for the labelling of rhodos! While the broken bus and driver waited for a mechanic to arrive the group headed off in the replacement bus to Brian Minter's garden centre in Chilliwack for a spending spree on the plant candy at Minters.

Meanwhile Bill Dumont and several helpers set up shop and cooked a special lunch for the group at the beautiful Gwynne Vaughan Park nearby. It's fair to call any lunch with cheddar cheese and bacon grilled sandwiches, fresh potato and fruit salads, lemon and chocolate cakes *special*! Just as we finished the lunch our original bus showed up in working order and the second transfer of baggage and plants beganalbeit in a more chaotic manner.



The driver and the guide were happy nobody bought any of the 20 gallon rhodos available or any of the most impressive huge palms at this nursery. Another plant buying spree ensued fully constrained by the lack of time and any more space on the bus.

We caught the 5 pm Spirit of Vancouver Island ferry to Swartz Bay and had our final feast onboard for our famished group at the Pacific Buffet with its chocolate decadence dessert table. A tired but satisfied group and their new plant treasures arrived early Saturday evening at the Duncan train station with a big load of plants and good memories of a great trip to the Fraser Valley.
